



Specialist Course

Cities and Exchange in Medieval Europe

20 - 24 June 2011 Bruges, Ghent and Lille

Participants to the Specialist Course "Cities and Exchange in Medieval Europe" will explore the development of the late medieval city from several perspectives and with particular focus on the city of Bruges. During the last centuries of the Middle Ages, the city of Bruges was a prosperous financial and trading center as well as a city of international importance and cultural influence.

Through a series of lectures and presentations with prominent scholars and curators, participants will evaluate the economic growth of the city on the basis of the charters, city accounts, registers of confraternities and inventories, assessing urban growth by maps of Bruges held in the City Archives. Surviving objects from the Groeninge Museum, Memling in Sint-Jan and the Public Library, bear witness to the high quality production of paintings, manuscripts, literature, in Bruges during the 14th and 15th centuries. Participants will discover how art manufactured in Bruges was widely exported, influencing the artistic production in other parts of Europe.

A number of the sessions have been designed to encourage discussion between speakers and the course participants. Students will be invited to make assignments on one or more subjects relating to their personal research and discuss it in public. The participants are offered the possibility to build up a network of contacts with younger and established scholars within the field of medieval studies.

The course is primarily intended for Ph.D. students in archeology, art, history and literature with a research interest in a (late-)medieval topic.
